The Focus Committee is an ad hoc committee appointed by the TPOA Executive Board. Its mission is to ensure that TPOA remains a vibrant association that informs members, builds community, and protects property values and nat-ural surroundings. The group is made up of homeowners from around the mountain: short- and long-term, part- and full-time residents. A key objective is to increase TPOA's capacity to deliver timely, relevant, and viable information to members.

This year we conducted analyses of TPOA's strengths and weaknesses (known as a SWOT analysis). We found great opportunities to better serve our members using updated on-line tools. These include ways to enable members to join or renew membership on-line, update information, and share resources. This year, pending support from the new executive board, we will select the most cost-effective and easy-to-use resources to enhance TPOA's service to its members.

To strengthen TPOA's leadership, we also looked at what's called "succession planning" in the corporate world; that is, making sure new talent is brought on board without disruption to the organization. To that end, we recruited persons with experience running neighborhood organizations to join with existing long-serving officers to complete the slate of recommended officers. We are confident this slate of officers will work well together to modernize and strengthen our association.

We have enjoyed camaraderie while researching ways to best serve our members and modernize TPOA. Watch for new developments over the coming months and ways for you to share your thoughts.

Mayor's Corner

As you know, the Town Council attempted to have its regularly scheduled meeting on December 8, 2022. Due to illness of staff and council members, we had to move the meeting to the following week. Per our Government handbook, without a vote to reschedule we must move on to the next scheduled town meeting date which would have been January 12, 2023, at 5:30 pm. As it turned out, this meeting had to be cancelled as well, due to the lack of a quorum. Each meeting takes time to plan and organize, including the sending of emails and scanning supporting documentation. There is a lot of work put in by our office staff for each meeting.

Along with daily town business, the Town Council is in the final process required to use the state Covid funds (APRA), and we must vote on these resolutions to complete the next required steps. In addition, it is almost budget planning time.

Because of the major water leak in December, I met with Graham County Fire Chief Eller about the concerns for fire protection. Now in the event that our fire hydrants cannot perform, dispatch will be notified. I have been checking into the SCADA system which would allow our technician to read the water level at the tank from anywhere and being alerted if a leak occurs.

Our town technician has successfully completed approximately 24 hours of training for the North Carolina Water Distribution Level 1 system. Our water system is a level 2 operation and Scott plans to attend as soon as training becomes available. Kim and Emily have also attended approximately 50 hours of training so far.

We are getting closer to implementing the new Edmunds financial computer program. One of my goals is to have an efficient all-around user-friendly water billing system and maintain our own payroll, saving time and money. Further, I hope to improve our town website to include videos of council meetings.

This past year was all about infrastructure. Some of the town tax dollars were spent to improve roads, re-roof town hall, buy a new financial computer program, upgrade the water-reading system and repair and replace a pump. I am equally pleased with the recognition we received for participating in County and Robbinsville events. It takes many hands to make a town run. I appreciate everyone's help.
